What do Habiba, a Somali teen who survives a shipwreck off the coast of Malta, Grimaud, a French archaeologist living in Tunisia, and Levent, a Turkish businessman working with the Erdogan government, all have in common? At first glance, not much... And yet, we will learn that their lives are inextricably linked. From France to the Mediterranean basin, by way of Africa, Daniel Rondeau offers us a novel that, similar to the motion picture film "Babel", interweaves the stories of its different characters, while also shining a light on the great geopolitical and societal issues of our times.

Everything begins with Habiba, a Somali adolescent who survives a shipwreck off the coast of Malta. She washed up on the beach a few days earlier, after a long and exhausting journey across the sea. Her brother has also made it, though he is in critical condition. They are the only survivors of a disaster in which dozens of migrants have died. Having lost everything, they have no idea where to go...

At that same moment in Tunisia, Sébastien Grimaud, a Frenchman and retired archaeologist who now devotes his time to writing, is contacted by Levent, a man working for the Turkish secret services. Levent's father was a friend of Grimaud's and, despite their political differences, had been a great help to the Frenchman's archaeological digs. Levent would now like to take advantage of Grimaud's expertise, and offers him the chance to join him in the illegal traffic of art works...

From the streets of Istanbul to the ruins of an ancient city pillaged by Islamists, from Tunis to the French suburbs abandoned by the state, Daniel Rondeau ties and unties the threads of contemporary chaos, where greed, politics, and religion intertwine... This novel will fascinate readers with its ambition, intelligence, and incredible gallery of characters.
